A SHORT HISTORY

Designed to be dropped by parachute, via C-130 Hercules or C-17 Globemaster III aircraft, or transported with a sling, via CH-53E Super Stallion or CH-47 Chinook helicopters, the M198 howitzer weighs in at just shy of eight tons. The M198 was designed to replace the World War II-era M114 howitzer. Capable of firing both atomic and conventional rounds, the M198 was produced to serve in a multifunctional capacity. Despite its capability to fire atomic rounds (removed from inventory in 1992), the M198 has been a conventional weapon. The artillery selection for the M198 includes high explosive rounds, rocket-assisted projectiles, illumination rounds, area deniability rounds, and even shells that are capable of seeking out and destroying the enemy.
