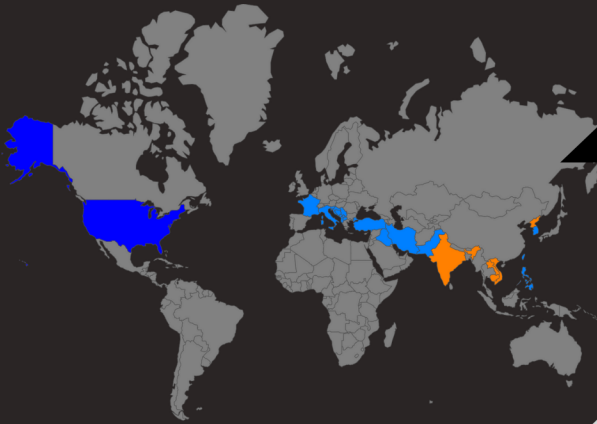


M36 TANK DESTROYER

A SHORT HISTORY

The M36 Tank Destroyer, sometimes referred to as the "Jackson" tank destroyer, was the American response to uparmored Panther and Tiger tanks in the European Theater. The M36 utilized the hull of the M10 tank destroyer with a larger 90-mm gun. The system saw use widely by the Allies during World War II and Korea. U.S. First, Third, and Ninth Armies were primary operators of the M36.

Many of these tank destroyers were also supplied to a number of NATO allies. In addition, many saw sale to nations such as Pakistan and Yugoslavia. Successor states to the former Yugoslavia still use the M36 in a limited capacity today.
