



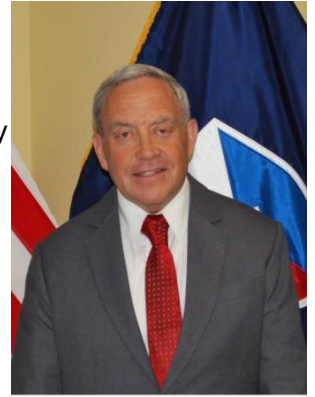

Mr. Michael N. Hampson serves as Deputy to the Commander, (DCO) 404th Army Field Support Brigade (AFSB). As the DCO, he is the senior Department of the Army Civilian within the brigade and serves as the Commanders' principal assistant in planning, coordinating and directing all aspects of the AFSB support. He assists in the supervision and oversight of the brigade staff, geographically dispersed subordinate AFSBns and other subordinate organizations, and assist in command oversight of external mission support and integration of acquisition, logistics and technology.



Mr. Hampson has over 38 years of global logistics and contract management experience in both the military and private sector. He has in-depth experience in project management, contracts, facility operations, personnel, food service, supply chain, transportation and maintenance management.

Prior to becoming the Deputy to the Commander, Mr. Hampson served as a Vice President and Executive Director in companies focused on government contracting from January 2007-October 2015. He served for 30 years in the US Army in progressive logistics positions including joint and combined assignments.
